Ladies, I thought it was about time to give you an update on the "State of the Nation" as we slowly inch towards Liberation Day, maybe the 19th July? By then it will be 16 months since we last met in the Memorial Hall, if, when the committee meets next week, we defer having a meeting till August at the earliest.

Despite the lack of face-to-face meetings and the inevitable drift away from human contact, which I am sure we have all missed, I am delighted to say that the vast majority of our membership have re-joined us for 2021. Our membership stands at 47 Full Members and 4 Dual Members, giving us a total of 51 Members. Last year we had 52 Full Members and 3 Dual Members, giving a Total of 55, so we have only lost 4 members over the period. I have spoken to those who have chosen not to re-join and have, of course, told them that I understand their personal reasons for not re-joining and have assured them of a very warm welcome back should they decide to re-join us in the future.

As you know, the Committee took a great deal of time to consider whether to reduce our element of the subscription fee for 2021 and decided that, on balance, it was appropriate for this year to reduce the fee, not least because we had, and continue to be unable, to provide the activities that we so much wish to organise and put on. However, we did give members the opportunity to donate extra funds to the WI to help maintain a healthy balance on our accounts and I am delighted to be able to report that 29 members have given a donation and that the sum raised is £248. All of us on the Committee are humbled that so many of you felt able to add a donation which we will use to the benefit of us all.

On a personal note, I would like to thank all of you for continuing to support our WI and, in particular, all of you who sent me such lovely messages of support along with your subscriptions, it was a real joy to open the post!

We were beginning to enjoy our freedom by now, so it was a long trip up to Blairgowrie to stay in a fishing lodge on the River Ericht in Perthshire for three nights. Fantastic weather and scenery. Home now to the garden but the break did us both good.



Janine's bacon and spinach cheese tarts.

These are perfect for a summer lunch, snack – serve hot or cold. Easy to make.

1 teasp. Olive oil for greasing.

Plain flour for dusting

1 pack Jus-rol ready to roll out puff pastry

200g spinach

200g crumbled Cheshire cheese (other cheese will do)

Back bacon – 1 decent sized piece per person

Seasoning

Beaten egg or milk to glaze the pastry.

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 200deg C
- 2. Line and grease a rectangular baking tray
- 3. Lightly dust board or worktop and unroll the pastry.
- 4. Dust a rolling pin and roll out further so the rectangle is large enough to make 6 squares don't roll it too thin! Cut the 6 squares.
- 5. Lightly cook the spinach 1 2 minutes until soft and drain well.
- 6. Divide the cheese between the squares, leaving the edges clear.
- 7. Top each one with some spinach and some bacon. Cut the bacon up if you prefer.
- 8. Season.
- 9. Fold the edges of the squares inwards. Pinch the corners in.

- 10. Brush the edges with beaten egg or milk.
- 11. Cook 12 -15 minutes until the pastry has puffed up and the bacon is crispy
- 12. Serve hot or cold nice with a salad. Great for picnics and lunchboxes.



Makes 6 tarts. The recipe can be varied with different cheeses, adding an egg or anything else you fancy. You can make smaller tarts by dividing the pastry into 8.

Janine's crafts – beachcombing at Crosby.

There was once a brick factory on the shore, just by where the lifeboat station is now situated. Tiles were made as well, but since the factory was abandoned, it has been gradually washed away by the sea, but the beach nearby is littered with bricks which have been eroded into all sorts of shapes, and pieces of tile as well. I have been collecting these to make a mosaic, and I finally had enough pieces to complete it. The whole thing is made on a tin tray on legs, which I bought very cheaply. It now makes a nice Bistro table to go with two chairs I have had for a long time.

It still needs the grouting touched up and varnishing to keep it in a decent state from the weather, but the photos show the nearly finished article.
