# A very Special Event

The 19th July 2021 is a day that will be remembered in our household as a unique and very special day. It is surprising to think that the events that led up to the day started 51 years ago on 16 September 1970 when my husband Tony and another fresh-faced youth, Mark Stanhope joined Dartmouth Royal Naval College as Officer Cadets. From that day they have remained firm friends sometimes serving on the same ships and submarines but eventually taking very different career paths. Tony left the Navy in 1982 after the Falklands Conflict while Mark stayed in the Navy, rising through the ranks till eventually becoming an Admiral and finally the Head of the Navy a post known as "The First Sea Lord". He retired from this post in 2013 and



was honoured by HM the Queen, becoming Sir Mark Stanhope GCB, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath.

Along with this honour comes your own coat of arms and eventually your own personal stall in the Lady Chapel of King Henry VII in Westminster Abbey. I say "eventually" because there are only 34 stalls in the chapel and more than 34 GCBs, so sadly one must wait for a stall to become vacant which only happens when a Knight dies. Mark fully expected to wait many more years before he was allocated a stall but along with 4 other GCBs he was invited to an Installation Ceremony on 19 July, also dubbed "Freedom Day" in England.

We were incredibly honoured when Mark invited us to be his guests at the Installation Ceremony, especially so as he could only have 6 guests. So, the day before we travelled to London and joined him and his wife at their daughter's house in Wimbledon. On the day itself we dressed in our finery and with newly polished nails (for the ladies) we made our way to Westminster Abbey



for 5pm. We were greeted at the Great West Door and while Mark got "robed" for the occasion, we, along with the guests of 3 other knights had Westminster Abbey to ourselves as it had been shut to the public. It was a blisteringly hot afternoon, but we had the benefit of 1000 years of stone keeping us cool. As an aside, one of the GCBs was unable to attend because his wife got pinged by the NHS app that morning, what dreadful timing!

After our wonderful private tour of the Abbey, we were invited to enter the King Henry VII Chapel beyond the main Abbey for the Installation Ceremony. The chapel was breath-taking. After the main Abbey with its hundreds of marble monuments and plaques, the chapel is beautifully ornate with spectacular stained-glass windows, intricately carved stalls and above the stalls, the banners of each individual knight. These banners remain in-situ until the knight dies when they are returned to the family. On the actual stall each knight has his coat of arms, and this remains forever, so each

stall encapsulates the history of the Order going back hundreds of years. The ceremony is steeped in history but essentially very simple with the Dean of the Abbey and the Bath King of Arms escorting the knight to his stall and asking the knight to confirm that he will continue to uphold all the promises that he made in the Oath that all knights swear when they first become a knight (at a different ceremony). After the short ceremony there were official photographs and time to enjoy and soak up the wonderful atmosphere before eventually leaving the chapel to be entertained by the Dean and his staff, accompanied by some rather nice champagne.

It was a very moving event and one not normally witnessed at such close quarters as guests before COVID sat in the main Abbey and watched on screens, not quite the same! For all that, the nicest thing for us was to see Mark so honoured after such a glittering career in the Royal Navy. That said, to us he is still just Mark, Tony's best mate.
